

MILLER - PACKWOOD

—Martin D. Miller— was born in White County, Tennessee in 1816, and died in Lawrence County, Indiana 1905. As a young man and before his marriage to Edith Packwood, he worked on the Ohio river packet boats. Saving his earnings and using it later to purchase land in Clark and Lawrence Counties, Indiana. Martin established his home in section two of Bono Township, Lawrence County. Here he raised cattle, grain farmed and operated water driven whip saw, saw mills. Marketing his produce in the old river towns of Clarksburg and New Albany. Hauling it by wagon transport, over the old Borden and New Albany trail.

Martin D. Miller married Edith Packwood January 7, 1840. Edith Packwood was the daughter of William and Ellen (Anderson) Packwood, she was born in Patrick County, Virginia, October 17, 1803 and died in Lawrence County, Indiana, December 2, 1883. After their marriage in Clark County, Martin and Edith Miller established themselves in Bono Township, and became members of the Old Liberty Christian Church, where they served until the Fishing Creek Christian Church was established in 1865, where they became charter members.

Martin D. and Edith were the parents of eight children.

MILLER - EDWARDS

William Miller, oldest son of Martin D. and Edith Packwood Miller, was born in Bono Township, Lawrence County, Indiana, March 30, 1842. He attended Common School and helped his father on the farm until 1861. When the Civil War began, he enlisted in Co. A., 24th Indiana Volunteer Infantry, serving one year, being discharged for disability.

January 10, 1863, William married Sarah Edwards, daughter of Young and Catherine (Briney) Edwards, of Lawrence County, Indiana. July 10, 1863, William re-
